Central Wisconsin State Fair Set to Bring Six Days of Entertainment, Agriculture, and Family Fun

MARSHFIELD — With just over a month remaining before opening day, excitement is building for the 2026 Central Wisconsin State Fair. Executive Director Dale Christiansen recently joined Hub City Times Presents to preview what's new this year, highlighting expanded entertainment, new attractions, food vendors, and family-friendly activities that celebrate

fan favorites.

Rock tribute band Hairball returns Wednesday after several successful appearances at the fair. Thursday's featured act is the country a cappella group Home Free, followed by country music star Chris Young on Friday.

Saturday introduces a new act to central Wisconsin as southern rock band Blackberry Smoke takes the stage. Christiansen said the group has developed a loyal following and is expected to deliver an energetic

Wheel of Agriculture Game Show, an interactive attraction where fairgoers can participate in agriculture-themed games while learning about Wisconsin farming.

Live entertainment in the fair's entertainment tent will also feature regional performers, including Casey Muessigmann, a former contestant on The Voice, who will perform Tuesday evening.

Christiansen said the goal is to create more interactive experiences throughout the fairgrounds for visitors of all ages.

Food, Contests, and Family Activities

Food remains one of the fair's biggest attractions, and visitors can expect several new vendors this year offering fish, specialty burgers, barbecue, and fresh baked treats alongside longtime



the fair's agricultural roots.

The Central Wisconsin State Fair will run August 25–30 at the Marshfield Fairgrounds, offering six days of live music, carnival rides, exhibits, competitions, and community traditions.

Grandstand Entertainment

This year's grandstand lineup features a variety of musical styles and returning

performance.

The fair wraps up Sunday with the ever-popular professional bull riding event.

New Attractions Across the Grounds

In addition to returning favorites such as the pig and duck races and the Dominguez family attractions, visitors will find several new activities this year.

One of the newest additions is the

favorites.

The fair will also introduce several fun contests, including a cream puff eating contest, a patriotic Uncle Sam and Betsy Ross look-alike contest, and the return of the popular cranberry spinning competition.

Children can once again enjoy pedal tractor races sponsored by Chili Implement, while Kinche Pedal Pull competitions will make their fair debut after a successful appearance earlier this summer.

Admission and Specials

Tuesday continues to be one of the fair's best bargains.

Admission is \$5, or visitors may receive free admission by bringing two non-perishable food items to support local food pantries. Last year's food drive collected more than 2,000 pounds of food for area organizations.

Daily gate admission remains \$10, while season passes are available through the fair office or online.

Concert tickets purchased in advance include gate admission for that day, a reminder Christiansen encouraged attendees to keep in mind before arriving at the fairgrounds.

Looking Beyond Fair Week

Christiansen noted the Central Wisconsin State Fair continues to expand its year-round programming.

This year's successful Born to Dairy event celebrated Wisconsin agriculture with food, entertainment, educational activities, and family fun. The fair also plans to continue its popular Christmas fundraiser later this fall, transforming the Junior Fair Building into a festive holiday venue complete with dinner, music, raffles, and community fellowship.

Fairgrounds facilities also remain available throughout the year for meetings, celebrations, and community events.

Looking Ahead

As preparations continue, Christiansen said organizers are hoping for another year of favorable weather and strong attendance.

"We're looking forward to another great fair," he said, encouraging families to purchase tickets early and make plans to experience everything the Central Wisconsin State Fair has to offer.

County Connections Highlights Community Partnerships, Public Safety, and Local Success Stories

WOOD COUNTY, Wis. — From community events and conservation efforts to public safety initiatives and national television exposure, Wood County Sheriff Shawn Becker shared a wide range of updates during the latest episode of County Connections.

One of the highlights was the successful completion of the 60th Wisconsin State Water Ski Championships in Wisconsin Rapids. Sheriff Becker praised the volunteers, public safety agencies, and community organizations that worked together to host the long-running event, noting that favorable weather and strong coordination resulted in a safe and successful weekend for thousands of attendees.

The sheriff also recognized a recent community fundraiser held at Anchor Bay that raised approximately \$700 to support the Wood County Sheriff's Office K-9 program. Local businesses and residents continue to play a major role in helping fund the department's K-9 operations, which can cost between \$15,000 and \$20,000 for the purchase and training of a new dog, in addition to specialized equipment and vehicles. Thanks to community donations and grants, the department expects to continue expanding the program without additional taxpayer funding.

Sheriff Becker highlighted the continued success of the department's School Resource Officer and therapy dog program serving the Auburndale School District. During the summer months, School Resource Officer Jesse and therapy dog Ripp continue supporting the community while assisting patrol operations when school is not in session.

Another point of pride was recognition for inmate programming at the Wood



County Jail. Nurse Practitioner Paula Hensel recently received top honors for a presentation focused on addiction recovery and inmate rehabilitation during a regional conference. Becker said the jail continues to emphasize treatment opportunities and community partnerships that help inmates prepare for successful lives after incarceration.

The sheriff also congratulated Deputy Michael Corey for earning the department's annual Top Gun recognition for the second consecutive year. The friendly competition measures firearms proficiency through a combination of speed and accuracy and has been a tradition within the department for decades.

One of Becker's favorite recent experiences involved helping transport an injured bald eagle to a wildlife rehabilitation center. Working alongside longtime wildlife volunteer Tim Bassett, the sheriff assisted in delivering the eagle for medical treatment after it was found injured near Vesper. Veterinarians believe the bird has a strong chance of recovering and eventually returning to the wild. Becker praised volunteers who donate countless hours transporting injured wildlife throughout central Wisconsin.

The Wood County Sheriff's Office will also soon receive national attention. Becker announced that body camera footage recorded inside the Wood County Jail will be featured on an upcoming episode of an A&E television series highlighting correctional officers and jail operations. A second documentary-style program, filmed on location inside the jail, is also expected to air in the coming months. Becker said both productions showcase the professionalism of the department's staff and provide the public with an inside look at the county's modern correctional facility.

Looking ahead, Becker encouraged

residents to support a fundraiser honoring Kasey Ramthun, a young woman who tragically lost her life in a crash on Highway 10. The event at the Vesper Community Center aims to support continued efforts to improve highway safety while remembering Kasey's life.

The program concluded with a reminder of how technology continues to aid law enforcement. Becker shared an example of how the department's Flock Safety camera system recently helped locate an elderly missing person after investigators tracked the vehicle into the La Crosse area, resulting in a safe recovery. He emphasized that the system is designed to assist investigations and improve public safety.

Throughout the program, Becker repeatedly emphasized that the success of many of these initiatives comes from strong partnerships among law enforcement, schools, businesses, volunteers, and residents working together to strengthen communities across Wood County.

Ginger Murray Shares Priorities, Experience During Get to Know Interview

MARSHFIELD, Wis. — Democratic candidate Ginger Murray joined Marshfield Broadcasting's Get to Know program to discuss her background, qualifications, and priorities as she seeks to represent Wisconsin's 7th Congressional District in the U.S. House of Representatives.

During the interview, Murray shared her roots in northern Wisconsin, growing up in Forest County and attending a small rural school before earning degrees from the University of Wisconsin-Madison and later becoming an attorney. She said her legal career has included serving as a city

attorney, family court commissioner, guardian ad litem, and owner of a family law practice focused on children and families.

Murray said she decided to run for Congress after waiting until her children were adults, explaining that she and her husband agreed she would not pursue elected office while raising a family. She said concerns about affordability, environmental sustainability, and reproductive freedom also influenced her decision to enter the race.

When asked about her priorities for the district, Murray identified health care and affordability as the two issues she hears about most often while campaigning across the district. She also emphasized what she described as the importance of protecting democratic institutions and constitutional government.

On economic issues, Murray pointed to inflation, tariffs, and tax policy as areas where she believes Congress can take action. She also discussed support for rural hospitals and clinics, advocating for expanding access to health care and exploring options such as a public health insurance option or broader universal coverage.



Agriculture was another major topic during the interview. Murray said farmers have expressed concerns about labor availability, rising costs, and succession planning for family farms. She proposed expanding access to low-interest financing for young farmers and creating additional support programs similar to those available for higher education.

Discussing infrastructure, Murray highlighted continued investment in broadband expansion, road improvements, and environmental protection. She said maintaining funding for broadband projects and enforcing existing clean water and clean air laws are important priorities for rural communities.

Education and workforce development also featured prominently. Murray expressed support for increasing financial assistance for students attending technical colleges, apprenticeship programs, and trade schools, while encouraging more professionals to work in rural Wisconsin through incentive programs.

When asked about public safety, Murray said she supports local law enforcement while emphasizing the importance of constitutional protections and accountability. She also addressed immigration enforcement, discussing concerns she has about civil liberties and due process.

On energy policy, Murray said she favors expanding renewable energy sources, including solar, hydroelectric power, and biomass, while reducing long-term dependence on fossil fuels. She also suggested encouraging renewable energy production alongside future economic development projects.

Murray concluded the interview by pledging to remain accessible through in-person meetings, virtual town halls, and technology that would allow constituents to provide input on upcoming congressional votes. Asked what she hopes voters remember about her campaign, Murray said she wants people to say she understood their needs and worked to deliver results.

NTC Film Festival Brings International Cinema and Filmmaking Workshops to Central Wisconsin

WAUSAU, Wis. — North Central Technical College (NTC) is inviting the community to experience the art of independent filmmaking through its second annual Film Farm Culture Festival, featuring internationally acclaimed films, filmmaker discussions, and free educational workshops.



During a recent interview with Marshfield Now, Jila Nikpay, Faculty of Video Production at Northcentral Technical College, highlighted the college's hands-on Associate Degree in Video Production, a program that blends creative storytelling with technical production skills.

Students learn every stage of the filmmaking process, including story development, scriptwriting, storyboarding, cinematography, editing, documentaries, music videos, commercials, and narrative filmmaking. The program emphasizes both creative expression and the technical skills needed for careers in video production.

The Film Farm Culture Festival runs July 23 through August 1 and showcases six independent feature-length films and documentaries from filmmakers around the world. This year's lineup includes productions from Iran, Brazil, Russia, France, Hungary, and Italy, all exploring the festival's theme of humanity's relationship with the land, agriculture, and culture.

Film screenings will take place at the Woodson History Center in downtown Wausau. Each screening includes a post-film discussion, giving audiences an opportunity to engage with the films and learn more about the creative process behind them. Admission is \$10 per screening, with tickets available online or at the door.

Nikpay says the festival is designed to introduce audiences to thought-provoking independent films that are rarely seen in traditional theaters while inspiring future filmmakers to tell their own stories.

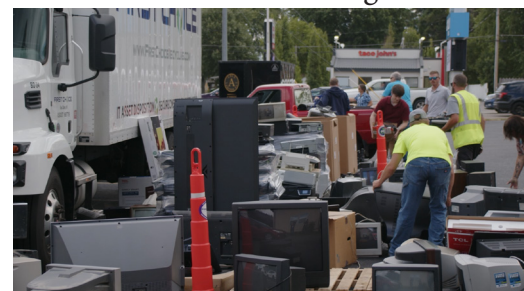

Free E-Cycling Day Fills Truck, Second Event Scheduled for August 6

MARSHFIELD, Wis. — The community turned out in force for Prevail Bank's Free E-Cycling Day on Wednesday, July 22, with residents dropping off unwanted electronics throughout the



two-hour event.

The response exceeded expectations as participants quickly filled an entire recycling truck. Demand was so high that organizers were forced to stop accepting electronics before the event ended after the truck reached capacity, leaving some residents unable to recycle their items.

To better serve the community, organizers say two recycling trucks will be available during the August event to accommodate the anticipated turnout.

The event provides residents with a safe and environmentally responsible way to dispose of household electronic waste at no charge. All collected electronics are securely recycled by First Choice, an R2v3 and NAID AAA Certified recycler, with personal data destroyed at its secure processing facility.

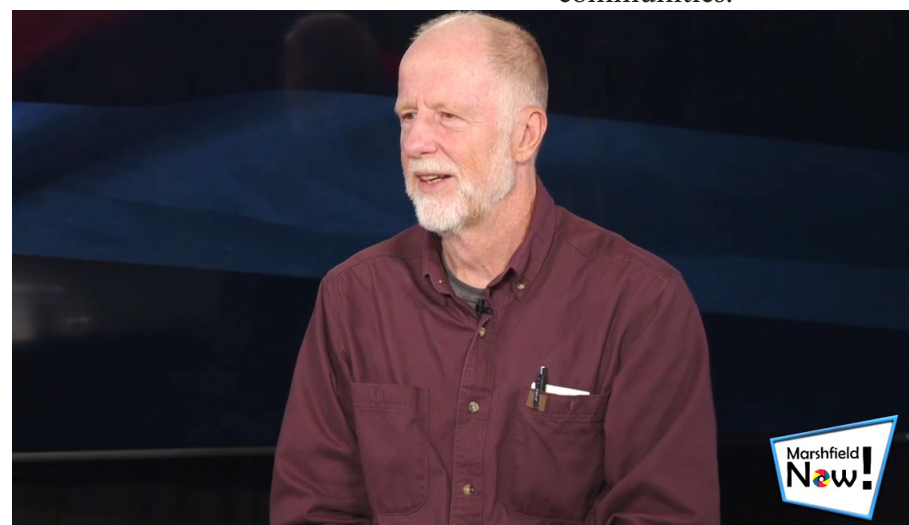
Residents are encouraged to arrive early, as another large turnout is expected.

Get to Know: Fred Clark for Wisconsin's 7th Congressional District

MARSHFIELD, Wis. — Marshfield Broadcasting's "Get to Know" series continues with an in-depth conversation featuring Fred Clark, a Democratic candidate seeking election to represent Wisconsin's 7th Congressional District in the U.S. House of Representatives. During the interview, Clark shared his background, discussed the issues shaping his campaign, and outlined his vision for northern and central Wisconsin.

Clark, who lives in Bayfield County, has spent much of his career working as a forester, land manager, and small business owner. He also previously served in the Wisconsin State



Legislature, where he worked on conservation, education, and other statewide policy issues.

During the interview, Clark explained that Wisconsin's 7th Congressional District covers 26 counties across much of northern Wisconsin, including Marshfield and surrounding communities. The seat is expected to become open following Congressman Tom Tiffany's decision to run for governor, making the 2026 election one of the state's most closely watched races.

Clark said strengthening rural communities is at the center of his campaign. He emphasized support for small businesses, family farms, and locally owned manufacturers, saying they are the backbone of the region's economy. He also expressed concern over rising production costs facing farmers and the challenges many rural businesses face in today's economy.

Several national issues were discussed during the interview, including tariffs, inflation, healthcare, transportation, clean energy, and gun policy. Clark voiced concerns about current federal tariff policies, saying uncertainty surrounding trade has negatively affected farmers and businesses. He also discussed the importance of maintaining affordable healthcare, investing in infrastructure, and encouraging renewable energy development while protecting rural communities.

When asked about gun policy, Clark described himself as both a hunter and gun owner who supports Second

Amendment rights while also advocating for measures designed to keep firearms out of the hands of individuals who may pose a danger to themselves or others.

Throughout the conversation, Clark stressed the importance of bipartisan cooperation. Drawing from his experience in the Wisconsin Legislature, he said elected officials should work across party lines to solve problems rather than deepen political divisions.

As the campaign season continues, Clark said he plans to visit all 26 counties in the district through town halls and community events to meet directly with voters and hear their concerns.

Get to Know: Congressional Candidate Niina Baum Discusses Rural Issues, Accountability, and Independent Leadership

MARSHFIELD, Wis. — Republican congressional candidate Niina Baum joined Marshfield Broadcasting's Get to Know program to discuss her campaign for Wisconsin's 7th Congressional District, outlining a platform centered on rural communities, government accountability, affordable housing, and protecting Social Security.

Baum, who grew up on a dairy farm in Price County and now lives in Rhinelander, introduced herself as a lifelong Northwoods resident with deep ties to the district. She described herself as a moderate, principles-first Republican and emphasized that she is the only candidate in the race who has pledged not to accept corporate PAC contributions.

Throughout the interview, Baum repeatedly stressed the importance of representing the people of the district

rather than special interests. She said the role of a member of Congress

Social Security. She also emphasized community-based approaches to



is straightforward: to represent constituents and provide oversight of the executive branch.

Among her top priorities, Baum highlighted protecting Social Security, addressing Wisconsin's housing shortage, and calling for a federal moratorium on large data center development until national regulations are established. She argued that rural communities deserve a greater voice in federal decision-making and said elected officials must spend time listening directly to residents throughout the district.

Economic issues also received significant attention during the interview. Baum discussed reducing barriers for independent contractors, limiting non-compete agreements, and creating regulations that are more practical for small businesses. She also spoke about inflation, government spending, and the need for Congress to pass balanced budgets while improving accountability for federal expenditures.

Healthcare was another major topic. Baum expressed concern over the challenges facing rural hospitals and clinics, calling for reforms to pharmacy benefit managers, greater healthcare price transparency, and continued support for Medicare and

addressing mental health and substance abuse in rural Wisconsin.

Drawing on her agricultural background, Baum discussed the challenges facing family farms, including market instability, consolidation within the agriculture industry, and the need to modernize the Farm Bill. She also addressed Wisconsin's forestry and paper industries, noting the importance of housing demand and sustainable economic growth to support those sectors.

Additional discussion included broadband expansion, workforce development through technical colleges and apprenticeships, public safety, infrastructure, renewable energy, and bipartisan cooperation. Baum said she believes many issues facing Wisconsin residents can be addressed through collaboration rather than political division.

When asked how she plans to remain accessible if elected, Baum pointed to her campaign's emphasis on meeting voters across the district, including a recent 400-mile bicycle tour through many Northwoods communities. She said maintaining open communication with constituents would remain one of her highest priorities.

Baum concluded by encouraging voters to research every candidate carefully and expressed her hope that, regardless of election results, people would view her campaign as one conducted with integrity and focused on serving the people of Wisconsin's 7th Congressional District.

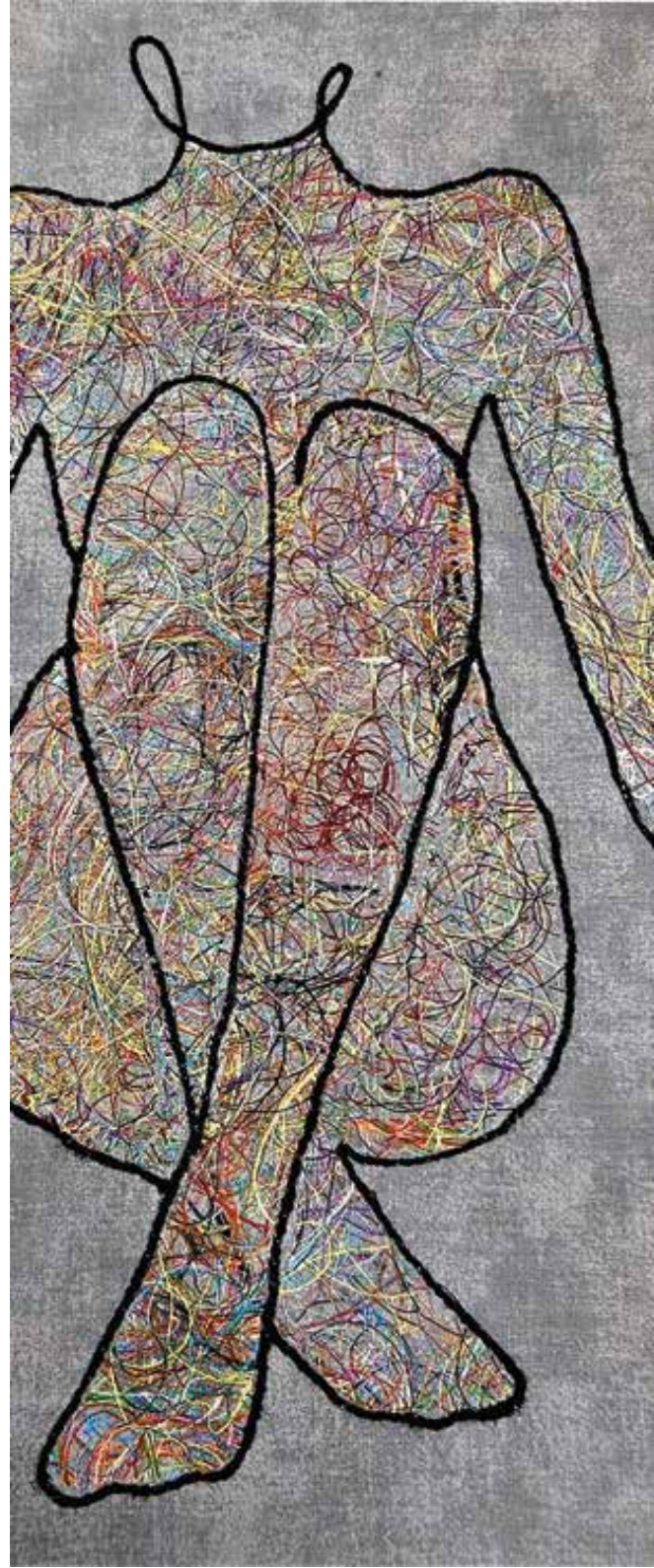
